Introduction

This policy provides for access to Iowa State University facilities and grounds, while preserving the primacy of the university's teaching and research mission.

This university policy is in accordance with:

- Iowa Code 721.2.5 prohibiting the use of university property for personal gain.
- Iowa Administrative Code Sections 681, sections 13.10 through 13.14 regarding uses of facilities and grounds. The Iowa Administrative Code prevails in any conflict with this university policy.

This policy applies to indoor and outdoor expressive activities that are open to the university community and general public, as well as "Public Events" as defined in this policy.

Public Events

"Public Events" are defined as outdoor events where more than 50 persons are participating or at which the sponsor reasonably expects more than 50 persons to be assembled, or indoor events where more than 15 persons are participating or at which the sponsor reasonably expects more than 15 persons to be assembled. Special rules apply to Public Events, as indicated in this policy and accompanying guidelines. Conduct at Public Events is also addressed in 681 IAC 13.16. See [Resources](#) below.

45 **Private Events**

46 This policy also provides information applicable to private events to which the general public is not
47 invited, such as weddings, reunions, and corporate events. See [Resources](#) for the Memorial Union Event
48 Management Office for more information and resources for scheduling private events.

49 **Commercial vs Non-Commercial Uses**

50 Except as specifically indicated, this policy is applicable to non-commercial uses. Commercial uses are
51 subject to the Iowa Administrative Code sections on Commercial and Charitable Uses (681 IAC 13.15).

53 **Policy Statement**

54

55 **Priority of University-Related Activities**

56 University facilities and grounds are primarily dedicated to its missions of teaching, research and service.
57 While facilities and grounds are generally open to non-commercial use by the public, students, student
58 organizations and staff, use for other than university-related purposes must not substantially interfere with
59 university activities and must be in conformity with the requirements indicated in this policy and in the
60 Iowa Administrative Code. University-related activities, including the activities of recognized campus and
61 student organizations, will be given priority.

62

63 **Not for Personal Gain**

64 No university or non-university persons may use university property or physical facilities for personal gain.
65 Persons or groups engaged in activities for which an admission is charged or collections of money are
66 made in any form may not reserve or use university facilities or grounds for such activities unless the
67 personnel and the activities are clearly associated with or a part of a university department or with a
68 recognized student organization with event authorization approval. (Iowa Code 721.2.5)

70 **Outdoor Areas**

71 **Non-Commercial Expressive Activities (Free Speech)**

72 ISU embraces the sharing of knowledge and ideas through public discourse and free speech. As part of
73 this community devoted to learning, ISU students, faculty, staff, and visitors are encouraged to engage in
74 respectful dialogue.

75 Any member of the university community or the public may use unrestricted outdoor areas for non-
76 commercial expressive activities on a first come, first served basis without giving prior notice if—

- 77
- 78 • 50 or fewer people are anticipated to assemble at one time (otherwise the use is subject to restriction
79 as a Public Event (see **Public Events in Outdoor Areas**, below);
 - 80 • The event will occur only between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.; for events held on weekdays
81 before 5:00 p.m., the event will be held at least one hundred feet away from buildings that normally
82 hold classes;
 - 83 • The activity will not impede walkways or access to buildings or other university facilities;
 - 84 • No other individual or group has been scheduled or authorized to use the area, or has filed a notice of
intent to use that area or an adjacent area;

- 85 • The organizers will not use amplification equipment or equipment requiring use of electrical power
- 86 connections (hand-held megaphones are permitted if used so as to direct the sound away from
- 87 nearby buildings that normally hold classes);
- 88 • Signs or banners will be carried/attended at all times by one or two participants (unattended displays
- 89 may not be used without permission); and
- 90 • The sponsor of the event takes responsibility for compliance with this policy.

91 **Public Events in Outdoor Areas**

92 The use of an outdoor area can be restricted if more than 50 people are anticipated to participate or to
93 assemble at one time (constituting by definition a “Public Event”) and if one or more of the following are
94 true:

- 95 • People will assemble within 100 feet of in-session classes;
- 96 • The use impedes walkways or access to buildings or other university facilities;
- 97 • An event held between 10:00 pm and 8:00 am;
- 98 • Conflict with a scheduled use;
- 99 • Amplification or electrical powered equipment (other than hand-held megaphone);
- 100 • Use of electrical power (e.g., for lighting, light shows) or staking of temporary structures deeper than
- 101 6 inches;
- 102 • Displays or signs and banners requiring more than two persons to carry;
- 103 • Serving food;
- 104 • Bringing in animals;
- 105 • Weddings, reunions, etc.; or
- 106 • The use otherwise violates university policy and rules.

107 *If none of the above bulleted conditions apply, the only requirement is that the organizer provide notice*
108 *prior to holding the Public Event. If one or more of the above bulleted conditions apply, the organizer*
109 *must request approval prior to the Public Event. See the following section regarding **Notice of or***
110 **Request for Outdoor Public Event.**

111 Preferred locations for outdoor Public Events covered under this policy are the areas south or north of the
112 Campanile, west of Curtiss Hall, south of MacKay Hall, south of the Hub, south of the Parks Library, and
113 west of Marston Hall provided the events do not conflict with university classes or scheduled activities
114 and provided the events conform to appropriate uses for the area.

115

116 **Notice of or Request for Outdoor Public Event**

117 The *Guidelines for Non-Commercial Use of Outdoor Areas* (see [Resources](#) below) indicate the
118 circumstances that determine whether notice or approval are required, and provide detailed instructions
119 for providing notice of or requesting approval of an outdoor Public Event. In summary--

- 120 • **Notice** of a Public Event must be provided to the Memorial Union Event Management Office (during
121 non-business hours notify the Department of Public Safety) at least 3 hours prior to the event.
- 122 • **Approval** of an outdoor Public Event must be sought in accordance with—
 - 123 ○ Student Activities Center Event Authorization process when recognized student organizations
124 make the request, or
 - 125 ○ Memorial Union Event Management Office when university departments or non-university entities
126 request a general university outdoor space, or
 - 127 ○ Other “Approving Units and Offices” as identified in the *Guidelines for Non-Commercial Use of*
128 *Outdoor Areas* when requesting specific outdoor spaces

129 Approval of events will be based upon—

- 130 • Whether the event is appropriate for the location;
- 131 • Compliance/intent to comply with the **General Rules for Use of Facilities and Grounds** section of
132 this policy (below); and
- 133 • Compliance with the *Guidelines for Non-Commercial Use of Outdoor Areas*.

134 Reasonable time, place and manner restrictions may be required. Unless the event will violate the law,
135 events will not be disapproved based upon the content of proposed speaking or expressive activity.
136 Persons denied authorization may appeal to the senior vice president for operations and finance.

137

138 **Indoor Areas**

139 **General Policy Regarding Use of Indoor Areas**

140 Any use of indoor areas must not conflict with university programs and events and must be compatible
141 with the purpose of the facility or the particular area to be used.

- 142 • Members of the general public and campus community are free to enter university facilities (other
143 than restricted areas) during business hours as necessary to transact business, seek information
144 about the university or deliver petitions or correspondence.
- 145 • Organizations and groups desiring to use university buildings and facilities for meetings, events, and
146 conferences should contact the relevant office(s) as listed the *Guidelines for Non-Commercial Use of*
147 *Indoor Areas* (see [Resources](#) below) to determine availability and fees for use.
- 148 • Organizations (other than recognized campus and student organizations) using classrooms, auditoria,
149 and meeting rooms will be charged the customary rental of those facilities. All users will be
150 responsible for costs incurred for set-up, equipment use, clean up and use of services and materials
151 of the university.
- 152 • To avoid disruption, the following kinds of indoor areas are not available for non-university related
153 assembly or solicitation: hallways, stairways, waiting rooms, residence halls and apartments, dining
154 facilities, work rooms, common areas provided around service windows, the Lloyd Veterinary Medical
155 Center and the Thielen Student Health Center. Atria and open areas in buildings are generally
156 available for use except when they are used as waiting areas or common areas around service
157 windows.

158

159 **Uses of Indoor Areas that Require Scheduling**

160 To avoid conflicts with university activities and permitted use by others, organized use of indoor areas by
161 groups of fifteen or fewer persons, that will substantially exclude others from using the same or adjacent
162 areas (other than transitory passage through public areas and hallways), require scheduling through one
163 of the “Approving Units and Offices” listed in the *Guidelines for Non-Commercial Use of Indoor Areas*.

164 **Uses of Indoor Areas that Require Approval**

165 Organized or concerted assembly or solicitation at indoor areas by groups involving more than fifteen
166 persons for non-university-related purposes must be approved as follows:

- 167 • Student Activities Center Event Authorization process when recognized student organizations make
168 the request, or
- 169 • Facilities Planning and Management Room Scheduling when requesting general university classroom
170 spaces
- 171 • Other “Approving Units and Offices” as identified in the *Guidelines for Non-Commercial Use of Indoor*
172 *Areas* when requesting non-classroom spaces

173 It is preferred that the online request be made at least ten business days in advance, and no less than
174 four business days in advance, of the activity. The approving unit will make every effort to provide
175 approval or non-approval (with a statement of the reasons for non-approval) in a timely manner. The
176 sponsors of the event may request a waiver of the four-day requirement. A waiver may be granted if the
177 approving unit determines that there are good reasons for an exception.

178 Approval of indoor events—

- 179 • Will be based upon whether the event meets the **General Rules on Use of Facilities and**
180 **Grounds** (see section below) and whether the event is appropriate for the facility.
- 181 • May be conditioned upon sponsors making reasonable assurances that the event will comply with the
182 General Rules on Use of Facilities and Grounds. In addition, reasonable time, place and manner
183 restrictions may be required.
- 184 • Will not be disapproved based upon the content of proposed speaking or expressive activity unless
185 the event will violate the law.

186 Persons denied authorization may appeal to the senior vice president for operations and finance.

187

188 **General Rules for Use of Facilities and Grounds**

189 The following rules are consistent with the Chapter 13 of the Iowa Administrative Code, sections 13.10
190 through 13.14. All users of university facilities and grounds must comply with these rules, university
191 policies, and state and federal laws.

- 192 • Organizations (other than recognized campus and student organizations) using facilities will be
193 charged the customary rental of those facilities. All users will be responsible for costs incurred for
194 setup, equipment use, cleanup and use of services and materials of the university.
- 195 • As part of the university's comprehensive effort to conserve energy and save money, activities will
196 generally be scheduled into buildings normally open and operational in the evenings. More
197 information may be obtained through Facilities Planning and Management Room Scheduling and in
198 the policy on the after-hours use of facilities (see [Resources](#) below).

199

- 200 • University facilities and grounds may not be used in a manner that substantially disrupts university
201 events or the lawful use by other persons; substantially interferes with the free flow of vehicle or
202 pedestrian traffic; results in injury or creates the threat of injury to persons; involves commission of a
203 crime or illegal behavior; damages or defaces university property or creates the threat of damage to
204 property; or results in significant littering, pollution or other nuisance.
- 205 • No person may conduct him- or herself in a manner so as to engage in harassment or stalking as
206 defined by Iowa Criminal law, or engage in sexual or racial harassment in violation of university
207 policy.
- 208 • No person may engage in public urination, defecation or other actions that create a sanitary hazard.
- 209 • Persons entering specialized facilities, such as libraries, recreation facilities, clinics, research
210 laboratories and other research facilities, and areas not open to the general public must comply with
211 policies established by such facilities. Questions about applicable policies should be directed to the
212 manager or supervisor of the facility.
- 213 • Weapons are not permitted on the campus except for purposes of law enforcement and as specially
214 authorized for purposes of instruction, research or service. A weapon is any instrument or device
215 designed primarily for use in inflicting death or injury upon a human being or animal, and which is
216 capable of inflicting death or injury when used in the manner for which it was designed. Weapons
217 include any pistol, revolver, shotgun, machine gun, rifle or other firearm, BB or pellet gun, electrical
218 projectile, bomb, grenade, mine or other explosive or incendiary device, ammunition, archery
219 equipment, dagger, stiletto, switchblade knife, or knife having a blade exceeding five inches in length.
220 Residents of university housing may possess knives have a blade exceeding five inches for cooking
221 purposes.
- 222 • Consumption of alcohol is not permitted in outdoor areas of the campus. An exception is made for
223 consuming alcoholic beverages served at approved events for which a valid liquor permit has been
224 issued as provided by state law, and for private events or designated areas at events. Unauthorized
225 alcoholic beverages are subject to confiscation.
- 226 • Vehicles are not permitted off of roadways or parking areas without permission from Facilities
227 Planning and Management Campus Services.
- 228 • For reasons of safety, sanitation, and preservation of campus property, camping is not permitted
229 except for special events approved by the senior vice president for operations and finance or senior
230 vice president for student affairs.

231

232 **Display of Non-Instructional Materials**

233 **Displays Within Buildings**

234 Posters, advertisements, or other visual display materials may be affixed only on permanent building
235 bulletin boards. Such display materials may not have a surface area of greater than 300 square inches.

236 Iowa State University students and organization as well as the general public may use "General" bulletin
237 boards without approval for posting information related to their activities.

238 Bulletin board notices must include the date they are posted or the date of the event and may be posted
239 no more than one month in advance of the event. Undated and early notices will be removed. Properly
240 posted notices will be removed after thirty days or in the case of advertisements for an event, after the
241 date of the event.

242 "Restricted" bulletin boards are limited to the use of designated departments or organizations. The official
243 representative of the respective department or organization must approve use of these bulletin
244 boards. Official university announcements/displays may be posted in a manner and fashion as deemed
245 necessary and appropriate by the president or senior vice president for operations and finance.

246

247 Exterior Displays

248 Residence Department buildings: Signs, banners, and other display materials may be affixed to buildings
249 only with the authorization of the Coordinator of Residence Life in each residence complex.

250 Academic, administrative and service buildings: Signs, banners and other display materials are not to be
251 affixed to buildings. Exceptions may be made in cases where the display materials have temporary
252 celebratory or informational messages. Prior approval of intent, location, design, and installation timetable
253 must be obtained from the Director of University Marketing and the University Architect. See Resources
254 below for Banner Authorization Request Form.

255 Exterior, not affixed to buildings: Signs, banners and other display materials are not to be affixed to
256 sidewalks, trees, fences, shrubs, light poles or other fixtures of the landscape. Freestanding displays are
257 not to be placed in any area other than those areas authorized through the event authorization process
258 coordinated by the Student Activities Center (for recognized student organizations) or by Facilities
259 Planning and Management (for university departments and non-university entities). See [Resources](#) below
260 for Student Activities Center Event Authorization Process.

261 Clean up: All visual displays must be removed 48 hours after authorization has expired. If clean-up is not
262 prompt, the university's Campus Services unit will remove displays and bill the unit or individual
263 responsible for the display. Unauthorized posted displays, banners and signage will be removed by
264 Campus Services and the unit or individual responsible for the materials will be billed for clean-up. Official
265 university announcements/displays may be posted in a manner and fashion as deemed necessary and
266 appropriate by the president or senior vice president for operations and finance.

267

268 Access to Facilities and Grounds and Access Restrictions

269 University facilities and grounds are generally open to public access **except** as provided below:

- 270 • Persons may not enter buildings or facilities without authorization when the buildings or facilities
271 are locked, when signs indicate they are closed to the public or when they are closed to the public
272 for specific events.
- 273 • The following facilities and grounds are restricted areas; therefore access requires express
274 permission of the relevant building supervisor, superintendent, or other person in charge of the
275 facility:
 - 276 ○ individual residences or dwellings
 - 277 ○ research laboratories or facilities
 - 278 ○ farms and associated buildings
 - 279 ○ animal storage and confinement facilities
 - 280 ○ utility and maintenance closets, mechanical rooms, utility facilities, and utility tunnels
 - 281 ○ storage areas
 - 282 ○ hazardous materials waste storage and handling areas
 - 283 ○ marked or fenced construction areas
 - 284 ○ institutional food preparation areas
 - 285 ○ private offices
 - 286 ○ work rooms
 - 287 ○ shops
 - 288 ○ areas where medical, psychological or other consultation takes place
 - 289 ○ radio and television studios
 - 290 ○ intercollegiate athletics competition facilities
 - 291 ○ areas which bear signs indicating that access is restricted
- 292 • The university has leased some of its facilities and grounds to other parties for use related to the
293 university purposes (for example, the Ames Laboratory and the National Laboratory for

- 294 Agriculture and Environment). Such areas are not open to the public use except as provided by
295 the lessee of the property or facility.
- 296 • The Scheman Continuing Education Building, Stephens Auditorium, Fisher Theater, and the Iowa
297 State University Research Park are managed by separate organizations that regulate usage of
298 these facilities and grounds.
 - 299 • Access to facilities and grounds may be denied when they are closed to the public for special
300 university events, or when access would conflict with an approved use of the facilities or grounds.
301 The university may limit or control access to areas of the campus for ceremonial events and
302 celebrations such as graduation.
 - 303 • Unapproved uses of university facilities and grounds by the general public are subject to
304 preemption for university activities for use by recognized student and campus organizations and
305 for uses by students, faculty and staff for purposes related to the university's mission.
 - 306 • Access to performances, art exhibits, museums and other exhibitions may be regulated by
307 requirement of payment of a fee for entry. Visitors are required to abide by policies established for
308 the various facilities and grounds.
 - 309 • Access to campus roads and parking is governed by university parking and traffic regulations, as
310 well as signage erected upon campus roadways and parking areas.

311

312 **Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS)**

313 All uses of UAS for other than ISU research, instruction or extension* must be pre-approved through Risk
314 Management. This policy pertains to non-ISU uses of UAS such as recreation, hobbyist, or commercial.
315 UAS are also commonly known as “drones.”

316 These requirements regarding UAS—

- 317 • Apply to individuals, groups, student and other organizations, vendors, and the general public.
- 318 • Include model airplanes and toys that may be operated by hobbyists for recreational purposes.
- 319 • Do not apply to university or university-sponsored* uses.

320 Operation of UAS for non-university purposes or events requires prior written approval from Risk
321 Management if the UAS takes off, lands, or is operated from ISU property.

322 For non-commercial, non-ISU uses of UAS, operators may be asked to provide proof of insurance.
323 See *UAS Procedures and Guidance* under [UAS Resources \(below\)](#) for additional information.

324 Commercial users of UAS, in addition to requesting approval from ISU, must—
325 Provide to Risk Management proof of appropriate insurance coverage
326 Comply with FAA regulations regarding the use of UAS

327 *University uses of UAS: All uses of UAS for university purposes by university employees or students
328 must also be pre-approved; however, the review and response processes differ due to FAA regulations.
